

it was done on McConnel's written recommendation.— I immediately addressed him a note requiring the return of the Commission as having improvidently issued—but have not yet received it and have reported the facts to the Adjutant General of U.S.

I can find neither in the Act of Congress nor in any order of the War Department any preliminary required to the Commissioning of these officers entrusted to the selection of the Governor of the State, and the absence of some such provision makes the duty a delicate and difficult one and therefore the more readily consent to the proposition you make in reference to the Brigade you were authorized to raise.

And should be much pleased if the Department would prescribe some rule that should enable the State Executive to exercise the appointing power with better chance of commissioning good officers.
