

By the 33rd Section of the 81st Article of the Code of Public General Laws it is made the duty of the Commissioners in the several Counties "on the first Tuesday in April in each year or as soon thereafter as may be" to appoint a Collector of Taxes.

By the 38th Section of same Art. it is made the duty of the Commissioners to inform the Governor on or before the 20th of April, whether this appointment has been made - and by the 39th Sec. it is made the duty of the Governor in cases where no such Collector has been appointed and qualified by the first of May in any year, by the County authorities, to appoint the Collector for such County.

The object therefore of Mr. Carter's letter was to call your attention to these requirements of the Code and to ascertain whether the Commissioners of Dorchester County have as required by law made this appointment, and if so that the fact should be reported at once to the Governor, as he, in default of such report is required to appoint -
