Your letter calling attention to the duty of appointing Collectors of State Tax &c, was received last night, and in reply have to state that there has been no appointment of Collectors made for this County since June last. It has been the custom for years past to make the County levy in June of each year, at which time the Collectors for County and State Taxes were appointed - If the appointment be made before the levy, we should not know what amount of penalties to attach to the Bonds of Collectors, nor would we know what amount of taxes would be put in the Collectors hands until after the levy. We await further instructions from your Excellency.
