I had the honor this morning of addressing you a communication in reference to a Battery of two guns of the State formerly in charge of the Junior Artillerists, and deposited by them at Fort McHenry, in 1861 for safe keeping.

Another Artillery Company (the 1st Artillery of Baltimore) was also possessed of a Battery of two 6 and six Pounders which were deposited at the Fort under similar circumstances. This Company is also about reorganizing and I have authorized them to take charge of said guns, and would respectfully make in their behalf the same request that I did this morning in the communication referred to in reference to the junior Artillerists and cause said guns to be delivered to said Artillerists.
