

to request that you will, if possible cause a Company of Cavalry to be detailed for service in that County with the view of protecting the enrolling officers there against similar outrages in future, and arresting if possible those implicated in the one that has been committed.

Mr. Clark the Commissioner whilst in the Court House engaged in hearing applications for exemption was openly assaulted and grossly insulted by an armed Rebel, who has been it is said for a year past in the Rebel service, and who though the room was crowded with people where the Commissioner was engaged, was permitted to enter and commit this outrage and to depart without even an attempt to arrest him — Mr. Clark who will bear you this will detail more particularly the circumstances of the outrage, and I trust that some course will be adopted in sending a force into that County to secure him in the future and vindicate the honor of the Government thus in his person assailed.

I would avail myself of this opportunity of again calling to your attention the necessity of putting at my disposal some funds that may be sufficient to meet the demands which the Superintendent of Enrollment tells me, are constantly being presented in connection with that service.
