consequence of the peculiar phraseology of those act and although the aggregate of these funds, together with dividends arising from the funds invested in virtue of solution number 38, passed at December session 1825, larger, when compared with our relative population & the appropriations of the State of New York, at the mencement of her system of public schools, and although very considerable accession of productive means major expected from the justice of the United States, under resolution above referred to, as will appear by referen being had to the report and resolution of the last sessing number 24, yet the whole of these resources cannot bees mated as sufficient for the munificent purposes, of the for the establishment of Primary Schools." It might how ever, be enough at present to assign, in addition to the funds, such balance as shall remain in the Treasury of Western Shore, at the conclusion of each successive fisc year, over and above the sum of twenty thousand dollars, h the support of that department of public munificence, pm vided, that the amount so assigned, shall not exceed the a gregate of white children within this State, between them of five and fifteen years, at the rate of two dollars per capital And as it is anticipated that an equitable and liberal system of revenue will be created, such an appropriation might k deemed adequate, and would probably operate as a sub cient encouragement and stimulus to assure the succession this design, and is, therefore, recommended with due submission and deference.

GENERAL AND CONCLUDING OBSERVATIONS.

The learned Chancellor Kent, of New York, in the second volume of his Commentaries, page 165, in commentaries upon the rights of persons, makes the following observations;—"This law, (referring to the law of Connecticute lative to education,) said the late Chief Justice Reeve, "had produced very astonishing effects, and to it is to be attribute the knowledge of reading and writing, so universal among upople of the State." And in a note the Chancellor addit that "during the 20 years in which that distinguished lawy was in extensive practice of the law, he informs as that univer found but one person in Connecticut that could mat write"

The respectable gentleman who fills the office of Clerk of the Supreme Court of the United States, has also communicated a circumstance still more extraordinary and administration.
