

POSTSCRIPT.

It may be proper to refer to sundry acts and resolutions having reference to Common Schools, since the act of 1825, ch. 162, to wit: the acts of December session, 1826, chapters 263 and 265, and the resolutions Nos. 78 and 79, relative to an appropriation of a portion of the public lands of the United States for the support of education. Also, the acts of December session, 1827, chapters 35, 42. (sec. 10) 43, 45, 46, 66, (sec. 6) 115, 153, 173, and 183. The bearing and tendency of each and every of these acts and resolutions, has an effect to infract or impair the general plan more or less, and their operation has demonstrated the obvious *policy of adhering to a matured and uniform system, such as, in their admirable results and influence upon society in NEW ENGLAND and NEW YORK, have manifested the early wisdom and practical knowledge of those States.*

A compliance with the requisitions of the resolution No. 33, of December session, 1827, will be presented in a separate report.
