Had your board seen fit, to adopt our propositions, the test, suggested by you, might then, fairly present for consideration.

Judge Roberts, who has been appointed by the chancellor, as the engineer on the part of this company, in conjunction with Mr. Knight on your part, to make the required surveys, is expected here in a few days. This board will then be ready, to proceed at once, to enter into the requisite arrangements for carrying the order into effect.
