The revenue thus derived from that part of the road that was completed, proceeded almost entirely from the transportation of passengers, the company being obliged to postpone the carriage of produce and merchandize until the completion of two tracks would enable the cars to depart at any time in either direction, without interfering with each other. It is believed that the transportation of produce and merchandize, for which the road is now nearly prepared as far as Elicott's Mills, will considerably increase the revenue of the current year and continue to do so as the road advances to wards the West, until the expectations of the stockholder, with regard to the profit to be derived from it, will be fully

It is believed that this company has thus, answered all the inquiries proposed by the committee of Internal Improvements, and in so doing, a fair and honest history of its pass and present condition and prospects, and the work in which it is engaged, has been presented. The wide scope of the inquiry must account for and excuse the prolixity of the arguer
