Making the whole amount of their receipts, \$180,638 53

Of that amount, \$2483 49 only, remained unexpended on the 3d of December, 1830, the date of their last report.

Sir—Agreeably to the provision in the supplement to the “Act respecting a monument or statue to the memory of Washington,” passed at the last session of the Legislature, requiring that the managers of the Washington Monument Lottery, “shall report to you annually, on or before the first of January, an account of their proceedings, together with a statement of the amount and objects of their expenditures.”

I beg leave, on behalf of the board to state, that, since the passage of the supplement above mentioned, and the acceptance of its terms by the managers of the Washington Monument Lottery, their treasurer has received from the treasurer of the State of Maryland for the Western Shore, as the surplus of the proceeds of the State Lotteries for the present year, over and above the sum of \$12,000 reserved for the use of the state, the sum of \$17,753 27, which has enabled them to discharge their debt to Col. Steuart, who has executed the work, amounting by his account to \$17,598 88
