An order of the House of Delegates, of the 21st January, 1839.

To the Honorable the House of Delegates of Maryland.

In pursuance of an order passed by your Honorable body on the 21st January, 1839, directing the Clerk of Baltimore County Court, to furnish the House of Delegates with a statement of the amount of money paid to each of the Judges of said court, in 1836, 1837 and 1838, arising from and out of the Taxes and per centage imposed by the act of 1828, ch. 161, and the several supplements thereto, distinguishing between taxes on original and final writs on Judgments, on Insolvent Discharges, amount of per centage on Insolvent Estates and Taxes on Equity proceedings.

The Clerk of Baltimore county court, in obedience to said direction, furnishes a statement showing the whole amount of money paid by him, in virtue of the act of 1828, ch. 161, and its several supplements, into the Public Treasury of the State, and to the Judges of Baltimore county court in quarter yearly payments in equal portions, which statement is in form, following to wit:
