Internal Improvement act, which passed at the session of 1835, for his company, should be immediately employed for its own benefit. With such a disposition of the forfeited shares of stock of this Company, as we have every reason to believe we shall soon accomplish and with no impediment in the receipt of the appropriation from the State, we may soon expect to have on our much neglected and misrepresented Eastern Shore, one of the straightest, most level, cheapest and and most profitable roads to be found on the face of the globe. Then our Shore, instead of being torpid during the winter months, and paralyzed by this torpor throughout the year, will be the scene of business and activity, and assume that position in the country, which the mildness of our climate, and the natural, productive power of our soil, entitle it to hold.
