14th. Respondent had no knowledge on the subject; but what he derived from a general knowledge of the condition of the country. He knew for weeks before it took place that it was inevitable.

18th. The notes of this bank are paid or redeemed by current bank notes, for which purpose its funds are deposited in Baltimore and Philadelphia, and checked for when wanted. It has but a small amount of gold or silver on hand for change, and to pay out fractions of checks.

cause our liabilities are very limited and easily covered.

20th. It would be ruinous to both.

23d. Our bank is indifferent on the subject, it awaits the action of

the larger banks, and is ready to resume when they do.
