lotteries is pledged by law &c. &c., beg leave to refer to the accompanying communications from the Commissioners of Lotteries, and the Treasurer of the Western Shore to whom they addressed letters of enquiry, on that subject. Your committee ask that the accompanying documents may be printed, and herewith report a resolution such as they think, under all circumstances, proper for adoption.
