Making up to December 1st, 1839, the end of the State's fiscal year, the average per annum, since the society has received any thing from the State fund, \$9,448 55, being less than the annual amount of \$10,000 provided for by the law. This law authorised a payment of \$20,000 the first year. The shipment bythe Lafayette, which does not come into our balance sheet, was made by the managers of the State fund, and cost as per their books, \$5,289 37, which with the other expenses of the managers of the fund, before they adopted the plan of employing the agency of the State society entirely, including the expenses of sending emigrants to Hayti, agencies in the State, publications, and removing manumitted slaves from the State who refused to go to Africa, amounting to \$7,570 72, makes the gross expenditure \$79,000 to the 1st of December 1839, the close of the State's fiscal year, while the expenditure authorised was \$80,000 in the same period.
