1. When did the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company give you authority to employ counsel to aid in procuring the passage

The authority which the president and directors of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company conferred on me to employ counsel to solicit the passage of an act by the General Assembly of Maryland in aid of said company by loan or subscription, to the extent of three millions of dollars, was given before either the eight million or the ten million internal improvement bills of that session were framed.
