copy of which he tells me he has given or issued to yourself and Mr. Knight only—but of which he brought enough to distribute

to each member of the government of Maryland.

I have advised and prevailed on him to go home, without doing any thing here—and he returns by the boat to-day. God knows we have troubles enough thrown in our paths, by our adversaries, and the publication of said appeal came unkindly in my path, most unkindly. To assert his rights, I would freely have acted by personally appealing to you, or your board, in due season, and in proper form, or if necessary to our tribunals—and of this, he has had ample evidence in times past; his publication was therefore as unwise, as to me it was unkind.
