

That it appears to your Committee, there remains in the Treasury, as of 1st December, 1848, the balance of three hundred and fifteen thousand nine hundred and forty-five dollars and thirty-two cents, \$315,945 32, which they find stands to his credit, as Treasurer, in the Farmers Bank of Maryland, and that it is subject to the following charges to that day, then remaining unpaid, viz :
