

That it appears to your Committee, there remains in the Treasury, as of 1st December, 1849, the balance of four hundred and eighty-four thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and ninety-six cents, \$484,892 96, which they find stands to his credit, as Treasurer, in the Farmers Bank of Maryland, and that it is subject to the following charges to that day, then remaining unpaid, viz :

And leaving a balance in the Treasury 1st December, 1849, by the sum of \$427,892 41, applicable to future demands on the Treasury.
