

That it appears to your Committee there remained in the Treasury, as of 1st December 1850, the balance of two hundred and forty-five thousand four hundred and eight dollars and eighty-four cents, (\$245,408.84,) which they find stands to his credit, as Treasurer, in the Farmers Bank of Maryland, and that it is subject to the following charges to that day, then remaining unpaid, viz :
