That it appears to your Committee there remains in the Treasury, as of 1st December 1851, the balance of two hundred and fifty thousand nine hundred and fifty-seven dollars and seventy-two cents, (\$250,957.72,) which they find stands to his credit, as Treasurer, in the Farmers Bank of Maryland, and that it is subject to the following charges to that day, then remaining unpaid, viz:
