

Present on the part of Baltimore County:

After reading the proceedings of the former meeting,

The consideration of the apportionment of the property, as previously valued, was then taken up by the board, when it was unanimously agreed that the old Tobacco Warehouse property should be divided as follows, viz :

DIVISION No. 1.—The lot marked C, fronting 120 feet on Block street, with a depth of 70 feet, as per plat, and valued at \$3.00 per front foot and the annuity, at this rate \$360 at 8 making \$4,500 should go to the City of Baltimore.....	\$4,500 00
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And the lot marked D, fronting 120 feet on Philpot street, and running back 70 feet, as per plat, and valued at \$2.00 per foot, and the annuity at this rate \$240 at 8 per cent. making \$3,000, should go to Baltimore County. The City of Baltimore paying to the County \$750 to make good the difference in valuation between the lot D and the lot C as above.....	\$4,500 00
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DIVISION No. 2.—The Jail property came up next in order ; when in view of the impracticability of making an equitable division of the property, it was unanimously agreed by the board that the City of Baltimore retain all this property, including the grounds, buildings and personal property, valued at \$35,000, say the City's one-half part \$17,500, and that the City of Baltimore pay to Baltimore County the like sum of \$17,500 for their one-half interest therein.....	\$35,000 00
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DIVISION No. 3.—The Court House and Record Office next claimed the attention of the board ; when, on investigation, it was found in the Laws of Maryland, December session, 1834, chapter 151, section 7, and 1849, chapter 540, section 5 ; that if at any time hereafter a separation takes place between Baltimore City and Baltimore County ; the whole estate in the present Court House shall be vested in the City of Baltimore, upon the payment to Baltimore County of one-half of the value thereof.	
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And after due consideration had thereon, it was unanimously agreed, that the City of Baltimore retain both those buildings, with all the ground thereto attached, at the valuation heretofore
