room between 11 and 1 o'clock next day and he would try and make the necessary arrangements for the payment of them; but between we met him, we called on J. W. Judd, for the deposite of \$10000 and for the draft of \$45000, and he said he would pay us the day osit of \$10000 the next day, which he did in the notes of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Greensborough, but he would not pay the four per cent which the certificate of deposite called for; but he refused to pay the draft of \$45.000 drawn on him by Samuel Waggoner & Co.; he said that they had not provided funds for the payment of it, and he should not honor it.

We also presented a certificate of deposite made by Samuel Waggoner to J. W. Clark, for \$3307.50, which he, the said Clark refused to pay.

Mr. Waggoner, G. W. Golsborough and myself had a private conversation at the effice of J. W. Judd, and the said Samuel Waggoner stated to us that he did not take the stock of said bank for himself, but only in his name for M. A. Bradly, and his, Bradly's friends, and that the said Bradly held his contract to that effect, and that bradly was to pay him some \$1,000 or more bonus, and that the said Bradly was to pay him a debt of \$3,000, which the said Bradly owed him and had been unable heretofore to pay him, and that he had in his possession several letters at home from said Bradly, requesting him to meet him in New York to arrange matters, but Bradly was never able to comply when he met.

And he also stated to us that he wished us to return home and bring the drafts and Memphis money with us, and try and satisfy the people, and he would come on in two weeks time and bring the blank sheets and all the notes signed, as he had the most of them in his possession, as very few had been put in circulation, and he would also bring funds to reinstate the bank upon her proper basis, and also redeem the Memphis money.

And the said Waggoner did not con e until on or about October 24th, and when he came he was called on for the blank sheets and notes and he said he could not get them, as they were in the hands of other parties.
