 he this deponent had some discourse with him about
 the disposition of his the said Gibb's estate and the said
 Gibb shew'd him an executed Will by which a yearly sum
 of Money or Tobacco was given to the Libellant and the
 greatest part of his estate to his Brothers Son in Scotland and
 this deponent further saith that to the best of his
 Remembrance freedom was given to a Negro Woman
 called old Bess by the Will just mentioned but that he
 never heard the said Gibb declare that he intended to set
 the rest of his Negroes free

To the sixth Interrogatory this Deponent saith that
 he saw the Libellant at the house of John Gibb a Year
 or two before his death and again in August to the best
 of his Remembrance next before he died that the said
 John Gibb hath told him that the Libellant sometimes
 came down from Philadelphia the Place she usually
 Resided at to see him but this Deponent understood
 that they never could agree long together which the said
 Gibb always charged to the Libellant's uneasy Temper
 this deponent further saith that the Libellant did
 not to his knowledge contribute anything by her self
 towards the Increase of the said John Gibb's estate
 though this deponent when he first saw her at Gibb's
 house that the house and furniture were cleaner and
 things in better Order than usual this deponent further
 saith the said John Gibb had told him that the same
 times sent the Libellant a hog head of Tobacco to
 Philadelphia and that he hath heard him talk of a
