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before and after it appears by the Depositions of many of the Witnesses and the Proofs of the declarations made by him it seems at least doubtful whether he really was of sound disposing Mind and Memory was to dispose of his Estate with that Prudence which is necessary upon such Occasions, But upon a Supposition that he was really in his perfect Senses and of sound disposing Mind and Memory yet if he was compelled by fear Circumvented by fraud overcome by Immoderate flattery or any other unlawful means to make his Will such Will is Void and that John Gibb the pretended Testator was under the Influence of his own slaves to such a degree as deprived of his Liberty & freedom of Acting which every man has a right to enjoy in the disposal of his own, which appears by several Wills he made by some of which he disposed of the Bulk of his Estate to his own Relations & declared at two different times that he apprehended his Negatives would oblige him to make other Wills which he accordingly did make and at several times expressed his consciousness of and concern for the Injustice he had done the Plaintiff and his other Relations and declared his intention to give them the Chief of his Estate, the Influence of the Negroes of the said John Gibb had on him is further proved by his Treatment of Mr. Harrison the Lawyer for only complaining of a Negro Woman's Misbehaviour from all which it seems to the Judge that the said John Gibb was compelled by fear of his slaves & other unlawful means to make the Will or pretended Will in dispute and that it was rather the Will of his slaves than his own because the said pretended Will so obtained is not only contrary to Law &
