To the Second Interrogatory this Deponent saith that he knew the said John Gibb and had known him for a considerable number of years before his death and believes he died sometime in the fall of the year 1747

To the Third Interrogatory this Deponent saith no

To the fourth Interrogatory this Deponent saith that he saw the said John Gibb in August 1747 to the best of his Remembrance when he took him to be in his senses, but whether it was the twenty sixth day or in what part of the said month he cannot recollect

To the Fifth Interrogatory this Deponent saith that he never to his apprehension saw the said John Gibb out of his senses

To the Sixth Interrogatory this Deponent saith that he know not where the said Janet Cleland was born but that the said John Gibb hath told him she came from Scotland with him, what induced her to settle in Maryland this Deponent knoweth not but from herself

To the Seventh Interrogatory this Deponent saith that to the best of his Remembrance the said John Gibb hath told him that the said Janet Cleland was his sisters Daughter

To the Eighth Interrogatory this Deponent saith he believes the said Janet Cleland hath been chiefly in Maryland since the Death of the said John Gibb and that he hath heard she hath lived at William Carmichalls, John Mcconickers and Thomas Williamsons at Annapolis but how she has been employed he know not

To the Ninth Interrogatory this Deponent saith that when he first saw the said Janet Cleland at the said John Gibbs the house and family were Cleaner and the family affairs in general seem'd to be in better order than usual and this Deponent further saith that the said John Gibb a few years before his Death shew'd him an Executed Will by which he had given the said Janet Cleland a yearly Sum of Tobacco or Money and further saith not
