

Maryland hath by humble Petition to this Present General Assembly Amongst other things set forth that the said John Echekill
 and had many Great Losses both Civil and Land Insomuch
 that he hath been thereby considerably disabled of satisfying
 his just debts for some of which he has been sued by his
 Creditors and hath lain in prison near four years and
 still remaines in the Custody of the same Sheriff of the
 same County of Cecil for such Large Summes as that all
 he hath or hath right to in the world will not make Satisfaction
 for And further that the said Echekill debts wherof he
 stands justly Engaged to his Creditors amount to about
 five hundred and twenty pounds in money and that all the
 Estates Effects or Interest that he hath in the world does not Re-
 ceive the value of fifteen pounds in money that he has made
 frequent Applications to his Creditors that they would
 take all that he had at present in part of what he owed
 amongst them and grant him liberty that he might
 have the better opportunity of getting wherewithal to pay
 them and providing for his wife and three small Children
 who must otherwise Inevitably fall upon the Charity of that
 County or undertake the extreme pressure of want
 But that tho' some of his Creditors have been willing to
 relieve him and have Certified the same to this present
 Generall Assembly Others have refused so that unless
 relieved by an Act to be made in his favour he must necessarily
 Continue a prisoner whilst his wife and Children undergo
 all the misfortunes of a Ruined family that the said
 Echekill desires not a Discharge from his debts but only
 liberty to enable himself to pay them and thereupon the
 said Echekill prayed Release and for that the truth of the said
 Echekills Allegations and Contentions is made evident to this present
 Generall Assembly by Sufficient Testimony worthy of Credit
 and that his prayer seems reasonable and rather if granted likely
 to be of more benefit than a prejudice to his Creditors It is therefore humbly
 prayed that it may be enacted and Be it Enacted by the Kings
 most Excellent Majestie by and with the advice and Consent of the
 majorities Governor Council and Assembly of this province an
