N<sup>o</sup>: 6 *Examine* A Supplementary Act to the Act Entituled An  
 Act for the Relief of Debtors And Ascertainning the Manner  
 of Sundry in Tobacco

Forasmuch as the time limited by the said Act for Sundrying Tobacco is  
 so short that honest Debtors intended to be relieved thereby have not the  
 Benefit <sup>that was</sup> intended them by the Assembly and for that many of the Inhabitants  
 of this Province have complained that several Sheriffs have refused good Mer-  
 chantable Tobacco for publick and other Uses and Officers fees w<sup>ch</sup> is  
 to extort great prices in Money from the Debtors or Make some other  
 unjust profit to themselves Be it therefore Enacted by the Right  
 Honourable the Lord Proprietor by and with the Advice and Consent of his  
 Lordships Governour And the Upper and lower Houses of Assembly and the Au-  
 thority of the same that all Debtors Sundrying Tobacco at any time between

the
