CHAP.

## SECTION VIII.

b

ARTICLE 1. No person shall be allowed to suttle at any camp or station, or to any party or detachment, before he shall have obtained a licence from the commanding officer thereof, and shall also have subscribed these rules.

ARTICLE 2. No suttler shall be permitted to sell any kind of liquors or victuals, or to keep their houses or shops open, for the entertainment of foldiers, after nine at night, or before the beating of the reveilles, or upon Sundays, during divine service or sermon, on the penalty of being dismissed from all future suttling.

ARTICLE 3. All officers are hereby required to see that the persons permitted to suttle shall supply the soldiers with good and wholesome provisions, at the market price, as they shall be answerable for their

neglect.

SECTION IX.

ARTICLÉ 1. Every officer commanding in quarters, garrisons, or on a march, shall keep good order, and to the utinost of his power redress all such abuses or ditorders which may be committed by any officer or private under his command; if upon complaint made to him of officers or privates beating or otherwise ill treating any person; of disturbing fairs or markets, or of committing any kind of riots, to the disquieting of the good people of this or any of the United States, he, the faid commander, who shall refuse or omit to see justice done on the offender or offenders, and reparation made to the party or parties injured, as far as part of the offender's pay shall enable him or them, shall, upon proof thereof, be punished by a general court-martial, as if he himself had committed the crimes or disorders complained of.

## SECTION Χ.

ARTICLE 1. Whenever any officer or private shall be accused of a capital crime, or of having used violence, or committed any offence against the persons or property of the good people of this or any of the United States, such as is punishable by the known laws of the land, the. commanding officer and officers of every regiment, tropp or party, to which the person or persons so accused shall belong, are hereby required, upon application duly made by or in behalf of the party or parties injured, to use his utmost endeavours to deliver over such accused person or persons to the civil magistrate; and likewise to be aiding and affisting to the officers of justice in apprehending and securing the person or persons so accused, in order to bring them to a trial. If any commanding officer or officers shall wilfully neglect or shall refuse, upon the application asoresaid, to deliver over such accused person or persons to the civil magistrates, or to be aiding and assisting to the officers of justice, in apprehending such person or persons, the officer or officers so offending shall be cashiered.

## SECTION XI.

ARTICLE 1. If any officer, or any private, while acting in this state, should think himself wronged by his captain or commanding officer, and shall, upon application to him, be refused redress, he may complain to the colonel or commanding officer of the regiment to which he belongs, or to the lieutenant of the county, to obtain justice, who are hereby
