cancy shall or may happen, as aforesaid, to succeed any inspector or CHAP, inspectors, as aforesaid, refusing, removed, or dead; but should it so happen, that by deaths, refusals, or removals, there should not be persons enough left in the nominations of the commissioners, so as aforesaid to be transmitted, for the appointment of the governor and the council, then, and in such case, the commissioners of any county, or any three or more of them, where this shall happen to be the case, shall immediately meet as aforesaid, and elect two or four, as the case shall require, for inspectors, and, as before, transmit certificates of such nomination and recommendation to the sheriff of the said county, who shall forthwith transmit the same to the clerk of the council, to be as before laid by him before the governor and the council; out of which the governor and the council, as aforesaid, shall appoint a suffi-

cient number, according to the true intent and meaning of this act, to ferve as inspector or inspectors respectively, in pursuance of the recom-

mendation aforesaid.

- VI. Provided always, and it is the true intent and meaning of Proviso. this act, That though the commissioners are to elect inspectors annually, yet where they elect again a former inspector or inspectors, they shall continue such without any new appointment by the governor and the council.
- VII. And he it enacted, That every commissioner, who shall neg-Penalty on commissioners lect or refuse (not being prevented by sickness or some unavoidable ac- not meeting, cident) to meet, according to the directions of this act, to nominate &c. and recommend inspectors, or who being so met, shall omit, neglect, or refuse, to nominate and recommend inspectors, whereby inspectors shall not be nominated and recommended in pursuance of this act, shall forfeit and pay eight hundred pounds of tobacco for every such offence.

- VIII. Provided always, That no commissioner, who shall be an Proviso. inspector, shall have or be allowed, so long as he shall be an inspector, any vote in the nomination or recommendation of any other inspector. or inspectors; and that where any person or persons shall be appointed, in pursuance of such nomination and recommendation, as already men-, tioned, and shall afterwards and again be nominated and recommended to be an inspector or inspectors for the ensuing year, such nomination and recommendation shall be a sufficient power to such inspector or inspectors, to be and continue in the said office, without any further appointment, and so from year to year, so long as he or they shall be nominated and recommended as aforesaid.
- IX. And be it enasted, That every inspector, before he enters upon inspectors to the execution of his office, shall, under the penalty of five thousand take the oath offidelity, &c. pounds of tobacco, take the oath (or if a quaker, menonist, or dunker, the affirmation) of fidelity to this state, prescribed by the constitution and form of government, and also the oath prescribed by the act to punish certain crimes and misdemeanors, and to prevent the growth of toryism, and subscribe a declaration of his belief in the christian religion; which oaths or affirmations any justice of the peace may administer.
- X. And be it enafted, That every inspector, before he acts as such, An oath of shall, under the penalty of one thousand pounds of tobacco, take the office, &c. following
