C H A P. XXXIII.

An additional Supplement to the act to settle and adjust the accounts of the troops of this state in the service of the United States, and for other purposes.

WHEREAS, by the resolve of congress of the tenth of April, seventeen hundred and eighty, it is declared, that so soon as proper documents can be obtained, congress will cause to be made good to all officers and soldiers then in service the depreciation of their pay: And whereas, by the act to settle and adjust the accounts of the troops of this state in the service of the United States, and for other purposes, passed at October session, seventeen hundred and eighty, such officers and soldiers as left service between the said tenth day of April and the passing of the said act are not provided for:

Preamble.

II. Be it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That all officers and soldiers of the troops of this state, who were in service on the tenth day of April, seventeen hundred and eighty, shall have the depreciation of their pay while in service made good to them, in the same manner as is directed, by the aforesaid act, to officers and soldiers who were in service at the passage of the aforesaid act.

Certain officers, &c. allowed depreciation.

C H A P. XXXIV.

An ACT for the relief of Richard Richards, a languishing prisoner in Frederick county gaol.

WHEREAS Richard Richards, by his petition to this general assembly hath set forth, that he has continued a prisoner for debt in Frederick county gaol for a considerable time past, and still continues in the like deplorable situation, not being able to redeem his body with all the estate or interest he hath in the world, which he would readily surrender up and part with to his creditors, if they would accept the same, and grant the petitioner his liberty; and as the allegations of the said Richard Richards appear to this general assembly to be true, and that his lying in gaol can be of no advantage to his creditors, it is humbly prayed that the said Richard Richards may be relieved, according to his petition aforesaid: Therefore,

II. Be it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That in case the said Richard Richards shall deliver up and surrender to the sheriff of Frederick county aforesaid, in presence of two justices of the peace for the county aforesaid, whom the said sheriff is hereby au-
