An ACT to enable James Hunt to convey to William Deakins, junior, a lot of ground called Church of Scotland Lot, in exchange for other land.

THEREAS James Hunt, Stephen B. Balch, Thomas Bealt, of George, Samuel Davidson, Richard Dickins, Henry Townfend, Benjamin Stoddert, Charles Beatty, John Threlkeld, Brooke Beall, Robert Peters, and John Suter, by their petition to this general affembly have fet forth, that on or about the seventeenth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventytwo, colonel George Beall did grant, by deed of gift, unto the reverend James Hunt, and his successors, in toust for the presbyterian society and members of the church of Scotland, &cc. a certain let of ground, adjoining George-town in Montgomery county, containing one hundred and fixty feet square, being part of a tract of land called Conjuror's Disappointment, said lot after to be called Church of Scotland Lot; that said for is not yet improved, and lieth at the end of the main fercet of Georgetown called Fall's-street, in such manner as to prevent the extending of faid street through a new addition, purposed to be laid off to said town by William Deakins, junior, proprietor of seid Conjurer's Disappointment, much to the injury of faid Deakins, and town in general; that faid Deakins offers to give in exchange for faid Church of Scotland Lot, another parcel of ground at the opposite end of said street, contiguous to the old town, in the addition lately laid off by act of affemtly to George-town, by Thomas Beall, Esquire, being lot number one hundred and eightytwo, and one hundred and eighty-four, as in the faid plot-of faid addition will appear, containing one hundred and twenty feet square; that the preflyterian fociety having, after mature deliberation on the premises, unanimously agreed to accept the feid lots offered in exchange, as being a proper and full compensation, and have fully authorised and instructed faid Hunt, as their trustee, to convey faid Church of Scotland Lot to William Deskins, junior, by a good and sufficient dead of conveyance, and in exchange to receive a conseyance, by a good and fufficient deed in trust, from faid Deakins, or Thomas Beall, the present proprietor of the above described parcel of ground to be required in exchange as aforesaid, securing to them and their funceffors, for ever, the fame estate and right, and under the same titles and limitations, at they now held the said Church of Scotland Lot; and the faid petitioners have prayed an act may pass, to enable the said James Hunt to make the said exchange with the faid William Deskins, junior, in manner herein before recited, and to confirm the tame; and it appearing reasonable, to this general assembly that the prayer of the faid petition thould be complied with Therefore
