C H A P. LII.

An ACT to settle and pay the civil list, and other expences of Passed December 22. civil government.

HEREAS those who dedicate their time, abilities and labour, to the Preamble. public, ought to receive a reasonable and adequate compensation for their services.

II. Be it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the several Salaries alofficers of civil government, for the time being, shall be entitled to receive at the lowed, &c. rate of the following falaries, in current money, for the ensuing year, to wit: Each member of the council two hundred pounds; the chancellor, as judge of the land-office, one hundred pounds; the treasurer of the western shore six hundred pounds; the treasurer of the eastern shore one hundred and fifty pounds; the auditor two hundred pounds; the clerk of the council two hundred and fifty pounds; the clerk of the senate thirty pounds; the clerk of the house of delegates seventy-five pounds; the printer to the state four hundred and fifty pounds; the messenger to the council fifty pounds, current money.

III. And be it enaited. That all monies which shall remain in the treasury Monies to be after discharging the journal of accounts, and all monies heretofore appropriated first applied to to the use of congress, which shall hereafter be received, and all unappropriated money which may come into the treasury, be first applied to the payment of the civil list for the ensuing year.

C H A P. LIII.

A Supplement to the act relating to replevins,

HEREAS it has been found by experience, that to deprive the citi- Preamble. zens of this state of the power of suing writs of replevin in all cases where their property has been taken for taxes by collectors of arrearages, is, in many instances, productive of injustice and oppression,

II. Be it enaced, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That in all cases Replevins where personal property has been taken in execution for public taxes, by col- may iffue in lectors of arrearages, and not fold, and where personal property shall hereaster be &c. taken in execution for such taxes by collectors of arrearages, it shall and may be lawful for the person whose property has been or shall be so taken, to apply to any justice of the peace for the county, in which he resides; for a warrant to the clerk of the county, authorifing him to issue replevin for the goods so taken; and if the party applying shall, by his own oath or affirmation, which shall be reduced to writing, and figned by the magistrate, and such other evidence as the said justice may require, satisfy him that it is necessary for the purposes of justice that a replevin should issue, the said justice may and he is hereby authorised to
