IV. And he it enacted, That every commissioner appointed, or to be appoint- Their oath. ed, in virtue of this act, shall, before he acts as such, take the following oath, or affirmation, as the case may be, to wit: "I, A. B. do swear, or solemnly, "fincerely and truly declare and affirm, that as commissioner for -"county, or Baltimore-town, I will, to the best of my skill and judgment, "execute the duties of the faid office diligently and faithfully, according to the "directions of the act for the valuation of real and personal property within this "state, passed at November session, seventeen hundred and ninety-two, and the di-" rections of the act to ascertain the value of the land in the several counties of this " state for the purpose of laying the public assessment, passed at November session, " seventeen hundred and eighty-five, without favour, affection or partiality, and "that I will do equal right and justice, according to the best of my knowledge, "in every case in which I shall act as commissioner. So help me God."

V. And be it enacted, That every commissioner, who shall take upon himself Exempt from the execution of this act, shall, during the time he shall act as commissioner, be militia duty, exempt from all militia duty, or ferving on any jury.

VI. And be it enacted, That if any one of the commissioners aforesaid shall How vacandie, refuse, neglect, or be rendered incapable to act, the remaining commission- cies are to be ers, or a majority of them, may appoint some other in the place of the person who shall die, refuse, neglect, or be incapable to act; and if any three or more of the said commissioners shall die, refuse, neglect, or be incapable to act, the governor, with the advice of the council, may appoint some person or persons in his or their place, so as to make up the number of three commissioners, and they shall fill up the remaining vacancies in manner aforesaid; and the said commissioners shall continue to act until their powers shall be superseded by some future act of assembly.

VII. And be it enacted, That the commissioners of the tax shall meet at the Duty of complace where the county courts are usually held in their respective counties, on the missioners, &c. twentieth day of January, seventeen hundred and ninety-three, or as soon thereafter as they may have notice of this act, and as often after as shall be necessary; and the faid commissioners, at their said meeting, shall appoint a clerk, and also divide their several counties into districts, of not less than two nor more than ten districts in any one county, and not less than two large or three small hundreds in any one district, according to the population and extent of the county; and shall appoint, in each district, one sensible and active person, an inhabitant of their countly, and having property therein to the value of two hundred pounds current money, to be affessor of the real and personal property in each district; and the aid commissioners shall enter in a book to be kept for that purpose, the name of the
