CHAR. LXXVIII. Matthews, William Ward, John Rumfey, Alexander Stuart, John Thomas, William Gleaves, Augustine Boyer, Thomas Harris and James Pearce, be and they are hereby erected into a cor. poration, by the name of The Trustees of George-town School, for the purposes of receiving, holding and directing, funds for the benefit of faid school, and managing the interest and concerns thereof; which faid persons, so noninated trustees for George-town school, and their successors, to be appointed in the manner herein after prescribed, shall and are hereby declared to be one community, corporation and body politic, to have continuation for ever, by the name of The Trustees of George-town School, and by that name to sue and be sued, implead or he impleaded, and to make and have a common feal, and the fame to break, alter or renew, when and so often as they shall think sit.

How vacancies

III. AND BE IT ENACTED, That the aforefaid trustees, and their successors, or a majority of are to be filled. them, shall, at any and at all times, upon the death, resignation, or removal from the counties of Kent and Cacil, of any one or more of the trustees, appoint other fensible and discreet man or men of the faid counties to be the trustee or trustees to fill the vacancy created by the death, refignation or removal, as aforelaid.

Truftees to make ordinances, &c.

IV. And BE IT ENACTED, That the faid truffees, and their fuccessors or a majority of them, thall have full power and authority to make fundamental ordinances for the government of the school or feminary aforesaid, and the education of the youth, and to appoint such person or persons as they, or a majority of them, may think proper, to be-teacher or teachers of the said fchool.

Meet twice in each year, &c.

V. And BE IT ENACTED, That the faid trustees, and their successors, or a majority of them? shall meet at least twice in each year, at such times as shall be appointed by their own ordinances, in order to examine the progress of the students and scholars, and to hear and determine on all complaints and appeals, and all matters touching the discipline of the seminary, and the good and wholesome execution of their ordinances, on all which occasions a majority at least of the trustees shall compose a quorum.

And may hold property, &c.

VI. And BE IT ENACTED, That the faid trustees, and their fuccessors, may hold and enjoy? and that they may be apt and capable in law for taking, holding and enjoying, all lands, tenes ments, rents, fervices, portions, annuities and pensions, with all other inheritances, franchises and possessions whatsoever, of the gift of any person whatsoever that is willing to bestow them, for the use of the school aforesaid, or any other gifts, grants, assignments, legacies or donations, of any and all kinds whatever, for the use and benefit of said school.

Preamble.

THEREAS the act to which this is a supplement gives no power or authority to the chancellor to bring Joseph Forrest and Thomas Earle, or either of them, before him, in case either of the faid perfons should be imprisoned at the time of exhibiting his or their petition,

Chancellor to have certain powers, &c.

II. BE IT ENACTED, by the General Affembly of Maryland, That the chancellor have and possess the same powers and authorities in relation to the said persons, or either of them, as are given to the chancellor in certain cases under the ninth section of the act, entitled, An act for the relief of fundry infolvent debtors, passed at the present session of assembly.

Passed Jan. 16. An ACT to lay out and establish a road from the city of Annapolis to the city

Preamble.

of Washington, and to repeal the act therein mentioned. THEREAS by a resolve of the general assembly, passed at November session, one thousand feven hundred and ninety-fix, commissioners were authorised and empowered to examine the situation of the country between the city of Washington and the city of Annapolis, and ascertain and determine the direction and position of the nearest, most convenient and practicable road, that could be laid off between the faid two places, and report the same, with a plot thereof, to the next general affembly: And whereas the faid commissioners have undertaken and completed the same, and returned a plot of the said road, and it appearing from said plot, that the faid commissioners have carried the road in such a direction that it will pass over the Eastern Branch, one mile, or thereabouts, above the ferry kept by Matthew Wigfield, at a place where it will be necessary to make a causeway at a confiderable expence; and it also appearing that the faid road will more certainly, and with more expedition, be brought into use, if the location thereof should be altered, so that the same may pass over at the ferry kept by Matthew Wigsield; therefore,

Commissioners appointed, &c.

II. BE IT ENACTED, by the General Affembly of Maryland, That Thomas Duckett, Levi Gantt and Jacob Duckett, of Prince-George's county, and William Harwood, Leonard Sellman, Edward Hall and James Williams, of Anne-Arundel county, shall be and are hereby appointed commission fioners of faid road, and that they, or any four of them, be and are hereby authorised to alter the location of faid road, so that the same shall pass over the Eastern Branch at the ferry kept by Matthew Wigfield as aforefaid, and when the direction shall be altered, the said commissions ers, or any four of them, may and shall cause the plot of said road to correspond with such location.

Who are to o. III. AND BE IT ENACTED, That the faid commissioners, or any four of them, are hereby auper a road, to thorifed and empowered to open, clear and grub faid road, not exceeding thirty feet wide; and the faid road, fo opened, cleared and grubbed, shall be recorded among the records of Anne
