

IV. AND BE IT ENACTED, That in case any of the aforesaid commissioners shall die, remove, or decline to act, the remaining commissioner or commissioners, shall have power to appoint one or more persons, as the case may be, to fill up such vacancy.

C H A P.
XCIII.

V. AND BE IT ENACTED, That the said commissioners, or a majority of them, shall render a full and fair account to the levy court of said county, of the receipts and expenditures of all money by them received and expended in virtue of this act.

C H A P. XCIV.

A Supplement to the Act, entitled, An Act authorising a Lottery to raise a sum of Money to purchase a Fire-Engine, and erect Pumps in the Town of Easton, in Talbot County.

Passed Decem-
ber 24, 1810.

WHEREAS some of the managers appointed in the law to which this is a supplement have refused to act, by which means said law cannot be carried into full force; therefore,

II. BE IT ENACTED, *by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That James Earle, junior, Thomas P. Smith, John Bennett, Joseph Haskins and William Clerk, or a majority of them, be and they are hereby authorised and empowered to carry into full force and effect a law passed at November session, eighteen hundred and three, entitled, An act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money to purchase a fire-engine, and erect pumps in the town of Easton, in Talbot county.

III. AND BE IT ENACTED, That all power and authority heretofore vested in the managers of the law to which this is a supplement, be and the same is hereby made null and void.

C H A P. XCV.

An ACT to prevent Nuisance in the neighbourhood of Fisheries on the River Susquehanna and at the Head of the Chesapeake Bay.

Passed Decem-
ber 24, 1810.

WHEREAS it is represented to this general assembly, that persons owning fisheries situate on the river Susquehanna, and at the head of the Chesapeake Bay, neglect, at the end of the fishing season, to remove the pickle, cleanse the vessels used in curing fish, and suffer great quantities of fish to remain on the shore, which becoming putrid incommode and endanger the health of the neighbourhood; therefore,

II. BE IT ENACTED, *by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That if any person or persons using fisheries or a fishery on the west side of the river Susquehanna, shall for the space of ten days after the expiration of the fishing season, neglect to remove any putrifying pickle from the fishing shores, and cleanse the vessels used in curing fish, or suffer quantities of fish to remain and putrify on the fishing shores, any person thus offending shall forfeit, on proof thereof being made, for the first offence five dollars, and shall immediately remove such putrid fish and pickle, and cleanse the vessels used in curing the fish, and on refusal or neglect so to do for the space of five days thereafter, and proof thereof being made, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty dollars for every such offence.

III. AND BE IT ENACTED, That all fines and forfeitures incurred under this act shall be recovered as small debts are recoverable before a justice of the peace for the county where such offence may be committed, one half whereof shall go to the informer the other half for the use of the county.

C H A P. XCVI.

An ACT for the relief of Michael Walton, of the City of Baltimore.

Passed Decem-
ber 24, 1810.

BE IT ENACTED, *by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That the judges of Baltimore county court be and they are hereby authorised and directed to extend to Michael Walton, of the city of Baltimore, the benefit of the act of assembly passed at November session, eighteen hundred and five, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, and the several supplements thereto, without requiring the said Michael Walton to produce the assent, in writing, of two thirds of his creditors, as is prescribed by the provisions of the said act and supplements; provided, the said Michael Walton shall produce to the said county court satisfactory proof, that all property, effects and claims, to which he is entitled, in possession, remainder or reversion, in Great Britain,
