

The Lieutenant General's Opinion that it pass as it is
The Upper House upon the bringing of the Act for quietting
possessions from the Lower House again doth vote that it pass accord-
ing to the amendment of the last Clause & referred it till to morrow
morning

The House adjourned till to morrow morning nine of the Clock

September the 26th Present as before

Then was read the Act for quietting possessions &c. which the Secre-
tary carried to the lower house

Then came an Act from the Lower House for appraisment of Goods
which was read in this house

Came in Act for Weights & measures read
And the House adjourned till nine of the Clock in the morning

Monday September the 28th

Present as before except Mr Bateman

Came a messenger from the Lower House with the Act for
quietting possessions

Ordered that the Chancellor & Secretary go to the Lower House
with the Act for quietting possessions & yielding the reasons of the
amendments of this House to that Act and after some time of Con-
sideration.

Then came a messenger from the Lower house & question
being then moved whether in case any person hath formerly surveyed
Land & obtained Grant thereof from the Lord Proprietary & some
other person come afterwards the Surveyor not knowing the former
Bounds of the Land adjacent & run his Lines within the Lines of the Land
formerly granted & also obtain Grant for the same from the Lord
Proprietary whether the latter Patentee shall by this Act hold the
Land so by him surveyed & patented against the former Patentee

And the Upper House declared their Sense to be that by this Act
the latter Patentee shall not hold such Land against the former
Patentee & Question being further moved in case Land be only surveyed
& not patented whether the Title of the first Survey shall exclude
all after Surveys even tho' the latter Survey has been prosecuted so
far as to obtain a Grant under the Great Seal. And the Upper
House declared their Sense to be that the first Certificate being
Entered upon record shall exclude the latter Survey though prosecuted
so far as to obtain a Grant under the Great Seal. This Act notwithstanding
standing, provided the Person that hath Interest in the first Survey
have not suffered the time viz 12 months in which he ought by the
Lordships Condition of plantation to have taken a Grant of the said
Land) to be Lapsed

Then was read the Act for the Surveyour Generalls Fees
