Proprietary of this Province become bound in one recognizance
for the payment of one thousand pounds sterl^o unto Abel Snowe
of Curitors Office London Brother unto your Petitioner as by the
said recognizance upon record appeareth, That Abel Snowe aft^r the
said recognizance unto Judith Snow his mother as well as other his
Estate in this Province did give grant & make over to the use of the
said Judith her heirs & assigns, and further that the sd^o Judith
Snowe the said recognizance so as aft^r unto your petitioner &
his heirs did in like manner give Grant & make over as by the said
Deeds upon record likewise more at large appeareth. That your
Pet^r thereupon did commence his Suit in the hon^{ble} Court of Chancery
of this Province & brought your Honours writt of *scire facias* ag^t
Tho^s Gerrard by which the said Tho^s Gerrard was commanded to sh^w
cause why the sd^o Tho^s Gerrard should not pay the Sum of one thousand
pounds set by the recognizance due unto your Pet^r as aft^r that
upon false suggestions & bare averments unto that hon^{ble} Court he
did contrary to the right of your Pet^r obtain to have the same
dismissed out of that hon^{ble} Court to your Petitioners almost in your
