 us an account of what the Upper house or the former one of them (but
 which the Deponent is not certain) hath spent at your House this
 Assembly last yesterday morning, (which was Friday) the Deponent then
 said he could not do it without asking leave of my Lord or some of the
 Council for that he knew not whether my Lord might not pay their
 expences himself. Mr. Hall replied, No but so likewise, we would not have
 you speak to them of it, but give it to us without that. The Deponent
