

And M^r: Taylor carrying the Message accordingly -

Lower house 19th February 1674

It is the Opinion of this house that should the Susquehannah Indians be permitted to live among the Respective friend Indian Nations this Year it may be of Dangerous Consequence to the Province in General -

S^t. That their living among them may corrupt our Indians and mould them so to their own future Designs as it will inevitably prove prejudicial to this Province in Generall -

2dly: This house hath reason to suspect that the Designs of the Susquehannah in coming among the English and claiming Protection may be out of Design - Purposely to Dis cover the Strength of the Province and the Advantages they may for the future take should they be evilly inclined which will be of very Dangerous Consequence should they be admitted to remain this Year among the Neighbour Indian Nations -

3dly: We have reason further to suspect that the Susquehannahs & Senecas have private correspondence together notwithstanding the Scarcing Warre - between them which may be of Dangerous Consequence to this Province should they be permitted among the Neighbour Indians

If they are Absolute Enemies to the Senecas yet it will soasperate them for us to entertain them that should a Warre this ensuing Year have from between the Senecas and them, the whole Province in Generall must of Necessity suffer and therefore this house is of Opinion that it will be more safe that the Governor approue them a Place above the falls of Potowmack there being lime enough / if immediately laid hold on / to clear Ground enough to Plant Corn this year which is the only thing they seem to desire to live among the Neighbour Indians for -

Upper house -

The honourable Chancellor, Surveyor General, M^r: Chenev, and M^r: Taylor Desired to give a Verball Answer from this house touching the Opinion of the Lower house and reasons thereof hereabove sent to this house who go forth accordingly -

Lower house 19th February -

It was proposed to this House whether if the Susquehannahs should refuse to Remove to such place as the Governor Pleases to appoint them at the head of Potowmack, they shall be forced by Warre to remove or not; Voted that they shall go where the Governor pleases to appoint them or that they shall be forced by Warre

Upper house 19th o.

Upon consideration of the whole Matter by this house the Interpreter was Ordered to lett Hargrave the great Man of the Susquehannahs know, when he was at Mataponie with the Governor when told the Governor he would be contented if the English would lett him and the Susquehannah falls of Potowmack, that the Governor had Moved to the Person to live above the falls upon his Desire when told to the Governor, and that the Assembly were not intended in y^e election falls but are not willing to lett them go or to let me go
