Ordered that Major Charles Butler and Mr Robert Jones together lay out the Lines of Mr William Berroye Land according to the due Courses and Distances mentioned in his Patent thereby to Discover what Land is left Belonging that and the French a true Plat thereof, one of the said Berroye Land laid out in Presence of the Inhabitants of the Town to be Certified to his Lordship and Council with all convenient Speed.

Ordered also that William Berroye come and be present at the laying out thereof: and that the Surveyors are allowed for the Town to cause them laid out after the other way.

A Message from the Lower house viz J. Burgess, Mr. Cochrane, Mr. Foster appeared and laid down for Mr. Lyden, Mr. Lyden read, and Mr. John Dudley and it contains in the following Paper which they received and returned being Demanded to request their house that they have referred to appear for an hour in the morning having read their petition in Council for the hearing of the same - The paper was viz

Lower house of assembly 9th May 1682

The house of commons are humbly petitioned by the Inhabitants of the Town of New York and in your petition to the consideration of this house at the opening of the present Session of Assembly do humbly desire his Excellency viz
1st That we may request our Members out of each house as Agents for the Province to go to the Government of New York and there to treat with the said Inhabitants and to give a League of Peace and Amity with the Indians and that in their treaty with the said Indians there be put on the said the said between the said Province Inhabitants and the said Indian Inhabitants and make peace for or between them and the said Indians on the Indian and Indian Terms
2nd That peace and Amity be continued between us and the said Inhabitants and that the said Government may give us full and true Credit in which that his Excellency may supply some of the publick Expences with Power and shall answer that the said Province shall be exempted of the Expences arising from New York and
3rd That we may request our Members to continue to be present
