But say that due Consideration shall be had to every particular therein mentioned and what ever shall appear to be Grievance we the said Deputy Governors will take such care as the same shall accordingly be duly rectified

5thly. That it is necessary that bringing in Money be encouraged

6thly. That Money be the Publick measure and standard of Trade and Dealing and all Contracts and Bargains —
