How Excellency is pleased to propose to the Board that they would Advise
what may be best and most Proper for the Service of their Majestys and
Interest of the Country to settle the Land Office and fees thereof and what
that they would state the Case how that Office has formerly been held and
how it now stands to which the Gentlemen of the Council make Answer that
all Warrants for Lands and Patents did in the Lord Baltimore's time pass
out of the foresaid Office and all Certificates for the same were constantly
thither returned and there entered upon record of which his Lordships Secre-
tary had always the Custody and fees settled for Spauing and venturing all
such Writings as likewise that there was a fee settled by an Act of Assembly of
this Province upon his Lordships Chancellor for the sealing of all Patents
for Land that in the late Governour Copleys time a Law passed concerning the
same fees is as aforementioned unto their Majestys Secretary and Chancellor
which stands still unrepealed and they do further say that his Lordships
has now erected an Office for Granting Lands as formerly without fees
take all such fees of the People now as were prescribed by the subjects but for the
Well settling and fully ascertaining and regulating the same and that
and for the Satisfaction of the Inhabitants of this Province they do humbly
Represent that it will be absolutely necessary that this being the true state
