

if they do not all agree to come that the same shall be to those that do come provided they do immediately upon their coming employ themselves to such Persons as shall be appointed and give in their names that we may know who our friends and who not and that for all such as will not return upon these proposals by a day yet to come we do refuse all course of trade or Commerce with them and to that end that caution should be given them to prevent their coming to some or appear within the bounds of this Government for that if they do without coming in as aforesaid they shall certainly be deemed as Enemies and treated accordingly

And to prevent all mistakes of Friends or Enemies we do hereby injoyne and require all those that do come in under the penalty of forfeiting our friendship unto that our caution or detain any of those Indians of their nations that have now submitted or that do not come in and give up their names as aforesaid for that if they do we shall look upon them as confederating with our Enemies

4 We also propose that a copy of what terms we make to the Indians may be laid before his Excellency the Governor of Virginia that thereby that Government may see the Justice of our proceedings with them and be an inducement to them not to believe or countenance any of their Allegations nor any way to protect or Harbour them in this their contempt or breach of Articles with us

5 We also propose that it may be requisite under the present Juncture to send a certain number of Gentlemen of this Government not less than ten to the Indians to make known to them these our proposals and to treat with them thereon and also to descend to particulars with them in that Treaty and that they have a Latitude of discretion left with ^{them} so far as the Government shall think fit and convenient particularly about the place of the Indians living if by them proposed

6 That according to the first proposal to the Indians we conceive that some sober and discreet Persons be appointed nearly resident to every one of the Indian Towns to hear and determine any Complaint either of the Indians or English with one another and that determination of such Person shall be binding to both Parties unless the matter be of so great moment as to require an Appeal to the Governor and Council in such cases if either the persons to hear and determine the matter think fit or either of the parties desire an Appeal to the Governor and Council they shall be there transmitted with their Complaints

Then the Committee proceeded to examine the Report of Col. Hatcher whereby those Indians seemed Charged with Entertainment of strange Indians and turning out the Emperor and choosing a new one without the Governor's consent and by violation contrary to Articles we propose that them Indians may be sent for before the Governor and Council and they cautioned of that their Breach and the new Chosen Emperor either confirmed or revoked as thought fit and if the Governor and Council think fit to pass this Error by for the present that yet they be cautioned to give no more such Occasions for that they will not be endured and that if any strange Indians for the future comes to them it shall be sufficient for them to give notice to the persons appointed of the name and nature of such strangers

7 Then as to the Complaint of the Indians to Col. Courts of the Violence offered them by Mr. Turua Doyne and the misunderstanding betwixt them and Madam Blakiston we propose that the Parties be sent for before the Governor and Council and the matter to be heard and determined as in their Wisdom shall be thought fit and for the future all such Complaints to be heard and determined by the persons appointed for that purpose

8 That because there happens many Complaints about the bounds of the Indians lands and many Jealousies may arise about it we therefore propose that the persons to be appointed to hear and determine such differences do call to their Assistance 6 or 8 of the most substantial neighbours and determine the Indians Claim and according to the best Testimony that they can get lay out the bounds of their lands and mark them by Lines and Trees in the Presence of the neighbourhood aforesaid and the better to keep in Remembrance such Bound and transmit the same down to posterity that the said persons and so many of the neighbours with the Great men of the Indians go round the Bounds once every three years and renew mark & Line the Bounds
