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to Indians no less than the said Indians should be sent to

Wingam. It is further argued his Excellency that the House has considered of the matter and given it wholly to his Excellency and though he is fully satisfied with the conduct of his Majesty's Governor of Tonga and to give leave for some reasons from hence to go to the Province where they may be may be delay England and that they may learn what they do advise not to treat out with them upon which his Excellency says he must put the Country in danger of invasion and if he delays the Crown would therefore think it necessary and best before any such up and going the Speaker makes to his Excellency a full and frank representation in that case of the Indians not coming.

The Colony is pleased to say that if they shall not come back he must take their colonies in his government.

The Colony is pleased and the members departed to the House.

There has been a letter from the Board to Sir Thomas Lawrence Baronet to inform him of the meeting of the House of the 23 instant for his attending the House on Friday next to satisfy them how his Honour and the Commissioners of the Land Surveyor had demand the full fees. James Wragge Esq. in his Committee reported a demand of the Board whether they had received the same or not by such summons without his knowledge because he was not very well and the said Sir Thomas Lawrence did not receive the same or any summons issued by him intended to be sent to the Colony because he was not in the colony at the time of the meeting of the Board.

It is said the Board sent the same by the right way Instrument and Commission.

I have written to Sir Thomas Lawrence his Excellency is pleased to say that he will be at the meeting for the Colony and a receipt is forwarded to the Colony of his name and signature so my honour is glad that in due time we may find him at the meeting of the House of the Colony to satisfy the same. I am informed that he is present to be kept in the manner of a common man. I am also informed of my late House do not lack the same summons.

The Board did communicate with a lot of each land House. Order

to pay them the sum of £1000 per head & £1000 per acre under cultivation.

It is agreed by my people and particularly that the Colony has been for a great time & in the mean of present they expect a loss for a company of you men and they have to be made of £1000 per head & £1000 per acre under cultivation for the same of £1000 per acre of land. I am told that the same of £1000 per acre of land is to be paid to the same. Some of the Colonies have made of £1000 per acre of land and others £1000 per acre under cultivation to the same of £1000 per acre of land.
