 will not suffer the Justices to impose what Taxes they please on his Majesty's Subjects 5 That  
 he will demand and have Account from Clerks of the Proceedings in the House and Committees  
 6 That his Excellency should suffer the Law to be put in Execution against Juers suspected of Per-  
 jury and false Testimony but these we believe are only Petitions so is in reality the King's Governor  
 that such are Aggrieved at and may they either be Committed to their Obedience or long remain  
 so Aggrieved It is not to be doubted but the Province may labour under several Aggravances  
 such as the letting fall several Temporary Laws by which the Country's great Benefit Spending  
 so much Time and Treasure hath now been in doing very little settling the disputes daily  
 arising between the Lord Baltimore and his Majesty's Subjects about the Conditions of Plan-  
 tation &c and many other things of like nature which would better become your care and  
 time advising you to consider seriously what you have done and what you have and  
 ought to do we bid you farewell

A Bill for Ascertainning the Bounds of a certain Tract of land to the Use of the Nanticoke

A Bill for the more Effectual Suppressing Cursing and Swearing which is read the  
 second time

A Bill for regulateng Marriages and read the 2 time

A Bill for speedy Conveyance of publick Letters and which is read the 2 time

A Bill for Promotion of Learning and read the 2 time

And upon the Remark of the House that a saving be to the heirs of John Perry  
 Resolved that the House be Acquainted that upon due Consideration thereof and of  
 the Intent of M<sup>r</sup> John Perry they do not approve of any such Clause which may  
 occasion law suits and Troubles
