

I have the pleasure to receive your letter
 of the 10th inst. and am glad to hear
 that you are well. I have not time
 at present to answer you more fully
 but will do so as soon as I can. I

By this I mean the Laws of Maryland
 Executive and Judiciary are just in the
 same State but may vary in the
 Assembly Men which would be a great
 difference and you may think it good
 to see the enclosed papers as they relate
 to us in some particular things. I hope
 that there are other strong objections
 against the proposed Act of 1700 which would
 be offered to his Majesty hereafter.

But now the better to avoid any mis-
 take for the future in writing in this
 we advise you to be very diligent in
 Instruction about making all laws, writs
 or orders indeterminate without limitation
 of time and age, the reviving of laws
 without the Statute Expressly mention-
 ed in that Instruction and the reason of
 it might have been to prevent the like
 error in other Acts to his Majesty that you
 see now the inconvenience of passing so
