THIS house have proceeded to ballot for commissioners to meet at York-Town, and have appointed Mr. Hall, Mr. Bowie, and Mr. Craufurd, in conjunction with William Paca and Turbutt Wright, Esquires, to examine the ballot boxes.

The senate proceeded to ballot for commissioners to repair to York-Town in Pennsylvania, and the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, seased up, and delivered to the committee appointed by this house to join the committee of the house of delegates, to take the joint ballot of both houses, who retired to the conference room, and after some time return and report, that on examining the ballots of both houses, the following gentlemen had a majority of votes: Mr. Norman Bruce, Mr. John Bracco, Mr. Henry Griffith, Mr. Joseph Sim, and Mr. Thomas Smyth. Whereupon it is declared by the senate, that Mr. Norman Bruce, Mr. John Bracco, Mr. Henry Griffith, Mr. Joseph Sim, and Mr. Thomas Smyth, are duly elected commissioners to repair to York-Town in Pennsylvania, for the purposes mentioned in the recommendation of congress of the 15th of February last, and that any three or more of them have sull power and authority to act.
