Gentlemen of the general affembly, I HAVE been informed that some of the militia who were lately in service under my command, have expressed their dissatisfaction at their not having received their pay. Thinking it by

no means prudent that they should call at Philadelphia in their way home, and there wait the settlement of their accounts, I promised to use my endeavours that every thing should be finished in their own neighbourhood, and have taken such steps as I thought most likely to succeed, to get some person appointed by congress to settle with and pay them: but I have not learned when ther it has been mentioned in congress, and think it likely that in the multiplicity of their more important business it may be omitted. Persuaded that the march of the militia was serviceable to our cause and may again be necessary, I should be forry that occasion for any just complaint was given, or that a delay should discourage their marching on a future emergency. I have therefore, and because I know that many of those who cheerfully went have pressing necessities for the little due to them, taken the liberty to recommend this matter to your confideration, and to request that you will appoint persons to settle the accounts, and, if necessary, enable an advance by our treasury of the money due.
