THE advanced season of the year calls upon us to put an end to the business of the session as speedily as possible; we hope every thing material may be finished by to-morrow evening; at which time this house propose to rise, and have agreed to adjourn to the first Monday in March next.

The senate proceeded to ballot, and the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up, and delivered to the committee appointed by this house to join the committee of the house of delegates to take the joint ballot of both houses, who retired to the conference room, and after some time returned, and reported, That Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer, Thomas Stone, and Samuel Chase, Esqrs. had a majority of votes. Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer, Thomas Stone, and Samuel Chase, Esqrs. are duly elected commissioners for this state, to meet the commissioners of Virginia, for the purpose of settling the navigation of, and the jurisdiction over, that part of Chesapeake bay which lies within the limits of Virginia, and the rivers Patowmack and Pocomoke.

The senate adjourns till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, December 22, 1777.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Messrs. Magruder and Ridgely, from the house of delegates, deliver to the president the following message:

May it please your honours,

THIS house have taken into consideration the letter from his excellency Thomas Johnson, Esquire, of the 20th instant, relative to Messieurs Paca and Chase, and have therupon RESOLVED, That a delegate to congress cannot, consistent with the declaration of rights and the constitution and form of government, be at the same time one of the judges of the general court. Should your honours concur with us in opinion, the sense of the two houses may be notified to his excellency by the honourable president of the senate and the speaker of the house of delegates.
